Dear Congregation Members,

During the past two and a half years, I had had the privilege of being Pastor at North Main UMC. Before that at Bleecker UMC. My life has changed dramatically during that time and I pray I have changed some of your lives also during this time. One of the main things I have learned is to pray for each one of you as well as for myself. Praying with an attitude of humbleness and gratitude are certainly different than I was used to in the past. I have learned to be thankful for the many blessings I have had bestowed upon me by our Savior Jesus Christ as well as having been blessed to be your Pastor.

During my assignment at North Main many things have changed. We had to do a complete renovation of the Parsonage/Food Pantry building. This was a very long and stressful time for everyone while we were closed to this Ministry. We did major renovations to the drainage system at the Church building, both underground to the street and City drainage system as well as to the roof systems. In honor of our Lay Leader, Bill McDonald, we were finally able to install a handicap bathroom. In honor of Karen Holly we renovated the chapel, which has been a dream I have had for a long time. Finally, we did the renovations to Fellowship Hall which needed to be done due to the leaking of the drain system. Lastly, we have a new flat screen TV that we can use for classes and presentations that was donated in honor of Beatrice Cairo.

Lastly, we endured one of the worst years of most people's lives as we struggled with the shut down due to Covid 19. One of the good things is that we were able to come out of all of this slightly more resilient than we were before Covid, and due to everyone's continued support, we have able to maintain a financial balance and have paid all of our bills and even have some money set aside in reserve for any new emergencies that may occur.

I plan on being an active member of the congregation at North Main and volunteer on many of the committees that I worked on previous to becoming Pastor. I am still a Trustee and will continue to do whatever is necessary to maintain our beautiful church building and food pantry building. The Neighborhood Engagement program and Worship and Pastoral Care are both programs that I am compassionate about continuing, and I have been invited to re-convene the services at the Gloversville High Rise for the Sr Citizens there as they are now open.

Even though it is time that I step down from so many responsibilities, I will continue to help in whatever way I can to support North Main UMC, and I pray that we will continue for many years as the church we have become in our City reaching out to the Community with love and support. My continued prayers and grateful thanks are with each one of you.

11TH ANNUAL UPPER NY CONFERENCE

On June 17, 19 and 19 I met with the Upper NY Conference for a 3 day Zoom meeting. Each day started with prayers and Devotions. Bishop Webb did a great job of having many people involved with this aspect of the Conference. On Thursday morning was the Laity and Clergy Session and that was a time to update everyone on the many missions and teams of the Conference. Because I had enrolled as an Equalization member, I was able to vote on many petitions.

We had several training times before the Conference, but it went off very easy with over 600 Pastors and Lay members on the Zoom meeting. A new commission was established to study the effects of the 2022 conference dealing with Protocol of Reconciliation and Grace Through Separation that will be dealt with at the 2022 Annual National Conference. Our Congregation will be asked to study where we are on this issue and report through a survey as to where we will be on this issue should there be a Post-Separation UMC.

As I am on the Building Location Committee it was sad to see the number of churches closed this year. Only 3 were in the Albany District and none in our immediate area. There were reports from all teams including United Methodist Women and UM Men and the Equitable compensation and board of pensions. Petitions were approved for Fair and Equitable compensation and treatment for Local Pastors. Budgets were approved in the afternoon and a memorial service was for deceased members. All CLMs and Local Pastors, including myself, were recognized as being re-certified for another year by the DCOM

Saturday was a Juneteenth Celebration and Anniversary of the 11th Conference and the naming of all appointments for the next year which runs July to July 30. The ordination of new clergy was held in the afternoon on Saturday on Livestream. I did get it watch some of it but did a Celebration of Life in the afternoon so I did not see all of it.

GUN VIOLENCE

North Main will be hosting a study on gun violence for three sessions on Wednesday evenings from 6 pm to 7:30 pm. The dates are June 30th, July 7th and July 14th. This was presented in May by the United Methodist Church and Society. We felt it was well worth bringing to others, Thanks to Pastor Joyce, a number of community members have also been invited to join us. Gloversville Police Chief Anthony Clay will be a guest speaker on July 14th and will address his area of expertise which is domestic violence and the role of guns. Because of his schedule constraints, we will be doing session 1 on June 30th, session 3 on July 7th and session 2 on July 14th. This study will be held in Fellowship Hall. Printed copies will be available the night of each session.

The Gloversville Neighborhood Engagement, as part of the Glove City Coalition, met the public at Littauer /Little Huskies Field, Union Street on Thursday June 24, 2021 from 3:00 PM to 7:00 PM, targeting the city's 6th ward. Since the last event in May, more organizations have been added with 'I Can Breathe' and' I Will Speak' providing pizza to people who come to the field. North Main UMC will provide 60 snack bags of child ready snacks to the kids.

Rob Constantine Recovery Community and Outreach Center will again provide Narcan training at the field as well as go door-to-door. The Alliance for Positive Health will have opportunities for people to participate in STD testing anonymously and Fidelis Care will have representatives to assist people with health insurance. Door-to-door teams will have free Stewart's Shops ice cream certificates for children and they will be available at the field also.

The GPD Canine Unit was on the scene and the kids played ball with several of the police officers. We handed out the 60 bags in record time as the weather was spectacular yet hot. Over 20 different organizations were present. A big shout out to Pastor Joyce and Food Pantry EC Edna for organizing all that is required for this event. We also established the dates for our other events:

North Main St. UMC Food Pantry Monthly Report June 2021

It was another sunny warm day for our June pantry. The turnout was good and we had 43 families attend which included 11 new visitors. The totals were 77 adults, 45 children and 24 seniors. We were pleased that the weather was nice because we had set up a table outside to have all attendees make out new registration sheets as required yearly by the Food Bank.

We were able to offer a choice of a variety of meats this month that included frozen boneless chicken breasts, sweet sausages, hamburg patties, pork chops and hot dogs. We gave a choice of two meats along with frozen eggs, butter and cheese. The premade sundry bags included the canned vegetables, fruits, pasta, along with cereals, rice and tuna fish and other misc. items.

I was excited to have received a quantity of bread, hamburg and hot dog rolls, and donuts that were donated by Friehofer's outlet. I also received a donation of plastic bags from Price Choppers. Additionally, our new colossal re-useable bags arrived and they were not as we had ordered. Therefore we have a replacement order coming which gives us the opportunity to give out the incorrect ones as well as the new ones when they arrive. This is really good for the pantry as many people arrive with no bags and we have no plastic bags at this time.

Our pet ministry is going strong. We had food requests for 30 dogs and 41 cats. We now have an assortment of dog food and cat food on hand.

We will be again participating in the Gloversville Outreach on the 24th. We have 60 small bags of snacks to give out along with pantry schedules.

Thanks to all those who work so hard to make our pantry a success.
