During the past four and a half years, I hve had the privilege of being Pastor at North Main UMC. During this time, we have seen the United Methodist Churches struggle through the concept of "disaffiliation". Many things went into the decision to stay or go and a lot of it was financial. Many other things included how we would insure our large building and still continue to do the many missions that we have. During the 20th century, having an impressive building was a way to make a church's presence known. Impressive facades, of course, weren't the way the church became known in the New Testament. Paul reminded the church that they should not be known for their physical attire, but instead he encouraged them to "clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience" (Col. 3:12). Some churches spend an inordinate amount of time and money on the lighting, sound, musicians, broadcasting and staff associated with putting on an elaborate Sunday morning experience. The Bible is overflowing with people that God empowered to overcome adversity. Church history further attests to this. Christians have a gift whereby they come together and work for the long-term existence of the community of faith. It may mean that the facilities, staffing and priorities may change but the Holy Spirit and God's will for his church will not change. If you've gotten anything at all out of following Christ, if his love has made any difference in your life, if being in a community of the Spirit means anything to you, if you have a heart, if you care, then agree with each other, love each other, be deep-spirited friends. Focus on prayer and serving the needs of others. Love your Neighbors as you love yourself.

The Methodist movement was founded and grew because of small groups who cared and love Jesus. Jesus exemplified this when he chose 12 learners who he apprenticed to become his 12 apostles. I can attest to the fact that Jesus would be proud of our congregation and our Church as we strive to be the best United Methodist Congregation we can be. We welcome each other with open arms and share our love and concern through our prayer chain, prayer lists, prayer shawls, charity giving by our Women in Christian Service, our Monday free lunch, our Food Pantry and our participation in the Neighborhood Engagements and our service to Nursing Homes. We exemplify our theme "Love Grows Here". Yes, I think Jesus would be proud of North Main St United Methodist Church every Sunday at 10:30.

Food Pantry Report - July

It was a hot pantry day. The turnout was not a busy as other months but steady. We had 72 families which included 96 adults, 31 children and 58 seniors. We had five new families this month. We gave out pulled pork, hamburg, cheese, and butter. The dry bags had canned vegetables and fruit, peanut butter,

macaroni, kidney beans, soup, and canned chicken and tuna. There were the choices of cold cereal, juice, and shelf stable milk. We also had mayonnaise along with coffee and some tea. We will be restocking before the next month's pantry.

Our pet ministry is still doing very well. We had food requests for 18 dogs and 58 cats. We will be restocking with the monies that have been donated. We had a small supply of diapers in assorted sizes this month which was very well received. Again, thanks to all those who donate to the funding of our pantry and those who work so hard to make our pantry a success. A special thanks to Price Chopper for the donated bags which we were given to add to our outreach. We thank God that we have the chance to help those in our community who are in need. Trying to keep the costs down while getting



enough food items for those in need is ongoing. We are thankful for the grant money we have received and those who put the work into applying for them.

Food Pantry Report – August

It was a nice day for our pantry. The turnout was more than expected this month. I guess people are spreading the word as we had another group of new families with 12. We had planned on 80 but ended up with had 92 families which included 139 adults, 68 children and 59 seniors. We gave out Italian sausage patties, bratwurst, and eggs. We also had bags of apples and assorted salad mixes. The dry bags had canned vegetables and fruit, peanut butter, macaroni, and soup. There were the choices of cold cereal, juice, and shelf stable milk. We also had mayonnaise along with some coffee. We will be restocking before the next month's pantry.
