Food Pantry – January 2023

It was a chilly day on the 16th. I was thinking that with the holiday there might be quite a few people visiting the pantry. The turnout was smaller than expected this month. We had prepared for 80 families. We had 61 families attending which included 5 new visitors. The totals were 69 adults, 40 children and 51 seniors. We offered nice whole chickens, pork chops and cheese. Due to shortages at the food bank, we were unable to give out eggs or bread this month. We had pie crusts for those that wanted them. The premade bags included the canned vegetables and fruits, shelf stable milk, pasta, spaghetti sauce, stuffing, and soup. There was also a choice of cereals, rice, juice, coffee and other misc. items.

Our pet ministry is still doing ok. We had food requests for 18 dogs and 16 cats. We now rely on donations or purchases for our stock. Our thanks to all those who have contributed.

The costs for the food from the Food Bank are increasing as are all the costs lately. We are trying to keep the costs down and still give the people the food they need.

Thanks to all those who donate to the funding of our pantry and those who work so hard to make our pantry a success. We were pleased to have received the funding grant thanks to Pastor Joyce's work. This helps a great deal. Hope all are safe now that we seem to finally be getting winter weather.

Food Pantry – February 2023

It was chilly day on President's Day for our pantry. There were a number of people waiting for us to open at 10:00. We had expected about 75 families and we had 70. We had 11 new visitors. The totals were 78 adults, 30 children and 63 seniors. We offered eggs, butter, cheese, hamburger and a choice of fish fillets or fish sticks. We were unable to give out bread this month but we had some pie crusts from last month in the freezer for those that wanted them. The premade bags included the canned vegetables and fruits, flour, pasta, and soup. There was also a choice of cereals, rice, juice, coffee and other misc. items.

Our pet ministry is still doing well. We had food requests for 22 dogs and 33 cats. We have received monetary donations for pet food and now have a supply of both cat and dog food on hand. Our thanks to all those who have contributed.

The ramps that were installed at the exit door are very helpful for those leaving with their bags of food. The carts the people use run nicely down the ramp.

Thanks to all those who donate to the funding of our pantry and those who work so hard to make our pantry a success. We were pleased to have received the funding grant thanks to Pastor Joyce's work. This helps a great deal.

We are going to hold a bakeless bake sale in a couple of weeks. More info will be forthcoming. We've also decided to reinstate a voluntary dues amount for members. The amount that you give for dues is totally up to you. All agree that garage sales, etc., are getting to be too much for us to do, and are trying to find easier ways to fundraise. We will be selling Tastefully Simple this spring and fall and will have our actual bake/craft sale on Election Day. If you are able to help in any way, please see one of our members. Speaking of members, if you would care to join us, we'd love to see new faces. We can always use new ideas and help implementing them. Sadly, another longtime member has passed away. Shirley Galpin belonged to the UMW and then as we changed to WICS she remained a member. She always worked hard on the rummage sales and other events. In the past few years, she started going to a church closer to her home in Mayfield, but she still attended picnics and parties with us. We have made a donation in her memory to the NMSUMC fuel fund. She will be missed.
