

Pastor's Corner:

"Sing Praises"

Genesis 37:1-4, 12-28 and Matthew 14:22-33.

Most of us know the stories of Joseph and Peter. We remember the coat of many colors, the pit, the storm, and Peter walking on water. But some of the greatest lessons are found in the details we often overlook.

Joseph wasn't thrown into the pit by strangers. He was thrown there by his own brothers. Sometimes the deepest wounds don't come from our enemies—they come from people we love. Yet notice something remarkable: the pit wasn't God's destination for Joseph. It was simply the doorway to God's greater plan. The brothers thought they were ending Joseph's story, but they were unknowingly helping write the next chapter.

Then there's Peter. We often laugh because he took his eyes off Jesus and sank. But here's what we miss: eleven other disciples never got out of the boat! Peter may have stumbled, but he was the only one who knew what it felt like to walk on water. I'd rather be the person who sank while obeying Jesus than the one who stayed dry because I never trusted Him enough to step out.

Another overlooked detail is that Jesus didn't calm the storm before Peter stepped onto the water. The wind was still blowing. Sometimes we're waiting for God to remove every obstacle before we'll trust Him, while God is waiting for us to take the first step in faith.

Perhaps that's how God often works. He doesn't always remove the pit before teaching us purpose, and He doesn't always stop the storm before revealing His power.

So this week, don't be discouraged if life feels uncomfortable. Your pit may be preparing your future, and your storm may be strengthening your faith. Remember, God's greatest work is often hidden in the details we almost miss.

And one final thought: if God can turn a pit into a palace and waves into a walkway, He can certainly turn your ordinary week into an extraordinary testimony.
